Burchard will receive NABC Guardians of the Game Award

Indianapolis, Ind. -- The National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) will present its most prestigious Guardians of the Game awards to three current college coaches and one former coach during the 2010 NCAA® Final Four® and NABC Convention in Indianapolis.

Columbia (Mo.) College head coach and athletic director Bob Burchard will receive the NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Leadership, presented by Papa John's; Georgia Tech head coach Paul Hewitt is the recipient of the NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Education, presented by The Hartford; Mac Petty, head coach at Wabash (Ind.) College, will receive the Guardians of the Game Award for Advocacy presented by Sof-Sole; and former St. Bonaventure and Duquesne head coach Jim Satalin, the national director of the Coaches vs. Cancer program, will receive the NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Service.

The awards will be presented on Sunday, April 4, 2010, at the AT&T NABC Guardians of the Game Awards Show at the Murat Centre in Indianapolis beginning at 6 p.m. (EDT). Among the many awards to be presented during the show are coach and player of the year awards in NCAA Divisions I, II and III; the presentation of the NCAA Division I first and second team All-America players; the NABC Division I Defensive player of the year award; the NABC/Pete Newell Big Man of the Year award presented by YRC Worldwide; and the Naismith Trophy presented by AT&T to the nation's most outstanding player.

NABC Guardians of the Game Award for Leadership presented by Papa John's

In 22 seasons as the head basketball coach at Columbia College, **Bob Burchard's** teams have averaged almost 25 wins and have become a perennial national contender in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA). The Cougars have advanced to the NAIA men's national championship tournament 14 times, including 13 of the last 16 seasons. Among active coaches, Burchard ranks among the NAIA career leaders in wins with 544 and in winning percentage (72%). He was inducted into the Missouri Basketball Coaches Association in 2008 and has been active as a "Court Coach" with USA Basketball. He was the NAIA representative on a staff headed by Syracuse's Jim Boeheim in 2000; was appointed the NAIA representative for USA Basketball's Collegiate Committee in 2005; and served the NAIA as a "court coach" in the summer of 2008 when he travelled to Washington, D.C., for the USA Basketball Men's U18 National Team trials. Burchard, who is also the director of

athletics at Columbia, earned the Columbia Kiwanis Club's Don Faurot Sportsperson of the Year Award in 1996; and was recognized as a recipient of the Kent Heitholt Memorial Award, presented to an individual who is committed to the advancement of women in athletics, in 2004.

About the National Association of Basketball Coaches

Located in Kansas City, Missouri, the NABC was founded in 1927 by Forrest "Phog" Allen, the legendary basketball coach at the University of Kansas. Allen, a student of James Naismith, the inventor of basketball, organized coaches into this collective group to serve as Guardians of the Game. The NABC currently claims nearly 5,000 members consisting primarily of university and college men's basketball coaches. All members of the NABC are expected to uphold the core values of being a Guardian of the Game by bringing attention to the positive aspects of the sport of basketball and the role coaches play in the academic and athletic lives of today's student-athletes. The four core values of being a Guardian of the Game are advocacy, leadership, service and education. The Little Things

Playing the Statistics

“Why doesn’t Jimmy play more? He averages 12 points, 4 rebounds, and 2 assists. His statistics show he is a good player.”

Ever heard something like this before? Whether coming from a player or parent, statistics play such a huge part in the way that players view their value to the team as well as how they are doing. Many coaches watch hours of film after games just so they can get their stats correct. Compiling all those statistics can not only be time consuming, but it can take away from valuable time you could spend on other things as well as frustrate you when you see that stat that just makes you so mad, you want to go find that player right then and there.

This article, I wanted to see how statistics were being used by various coaches around the state. What players don’t always see is how stats lead to the biggest stat of all – the W or the L! Hopefully some of these strategies can help you as you head into this off-season reflecting on your previous season by looking at stats.

“Value Point System”

This is a system that I learned about this year. It originates at Oregon Tech and was developed by Danny Miles (<http://www.breakthroughbasketball.com/pr/value-point-system.html>). While there is quite a bit to Miles’ system (he sells a DVD and book on the website), the system does give you a beneficial number that does work well and is easy to relate to struggles. It also helps with parents who question why their son or daughter are not playing more. We started using this in the middle of this season, and although I had to tweak some of the cutoffs for scores, it really did correlate to how well or how bad we played while also showing individual player tendencies. Here is the formula:

Numerator = Pts + Rebounds + (2 x Assists) + (2 x **Recovery Stats**)

Denominator = (2 x FG Missed) + FT Missed + (2 x Fouls) + (2 x TO)

Recovery Stats = Steals + Blocks + (Charges x 1.5)

Take **Numerator** and divide by **Denominator**

The scale that I started to use was 1.75+ is Excellent, 1.5 – 1.74 is Very Good, 1.25 – 1.49 is Good, 1 – 1.24 is Fair, and anything .99 or below is Poor.

“Offensive Ratings vs. Defensive Ratings”

Dr. Dean Oliver is a long time statistician who has contributed to various statistical strategies. One of these includes the analysis of offensive ratings vs. defensive ratings. To sum it up, it is a “points per possession” chart. It helps keep track of the points you score per possession and the points that the defense scores per possession. While there are several ways to keep this statistic, one common formula is to add up total points scored and divide it by the sum of FGA, FTA, and TO. According to Oliver, there are four team factors that correlate directly to winning or losing a game – effective field goal percentage, offensive rebounding percentage, turnovers per possession, and free throws made per field goals attempted.

We have used this statistic in the past and it was always our goal to have an Offensive PPP greater than 1 and a Defensive PPP less than .75.

“Score-Stop-Score Sequences”

This is a method that is growing quite popular with the pros and being used by many of the NBA team statisticians. I have talked to a couple of coaches who chart this in games and they say it really helps them know how well they are playing. The Houston Rockets are one of the teams to be utilizing this system in the pros. Matt Hixenbaugh at MICDS in St. Louis made me aware of the system. He says there are several pro statisticians that have books out about this topic.

“Hard Work Chart”

I got this from Bruce Weber at Illinois. He uses a chart in his game called “Matto” points named after a former player who was killed in a car accident. It sums up all those hard work stats that don’t necessarily appear in the paper or that others see. As Weber recalls, he can’t remember a game they lost where they scored 40 or more Matto points.

We decided to use a chart similar to this called a hard-work chart. Players simply get a plus point for each time they get one of those stats. We can then have players who lead the team, we can look at certain stats, or we look at our entire hard work score for the game.

The stats we use are: contested shots, steals, blocked shots, deflections, charges, first to floor, 50-50 ball won, and forced 5 second calls (all 5 on floor get a point). We worked to get 30+ points a game.

“UNC +/- Stats”

At North Carolina, they keep another chart similar to hard work points. This system however has negative points as well. They use the chart for practice and games. Players who have a cumulative positive points can get out of sprints at practice, while players with cumulative negative points have to run extra after practice. These stats can be a combination of whatever you feel represents how hard your team works.

The “Cupcake” Chart

I just read about this stat method in May/June 2010 Edition of Winning Hoops. Matt Herting, a head boys coach at Bishop Verot High School, uses this method to motivate his players to play hard. Instead of getting a point for doing something that results in a hard work point, they receive a cupcake (with pink polka dots). The way that the chart started was that he had a player who told another player in practice to quit getting out-toughed. He said he was being a cupcake.

Now a chart sits in this coaches room with every player’s name on it large enough to be read by everyone. When a player is not tough enough in a game, he gets a cupcake and a pretty pink and white sticker on the chart. That seems to motivate the players because it is a very visible chart to all students in his health classes. Not only do they get a mark on the chart, but when it happens in the game, a coach will call the player’s name out and hold up a 12” by 12” paper with a cupcake on it. Players feel there is nothing worse than getting “cupcaked” in front of a gym full of students.



Coach Herting says, “Even my best players have responded. If a player has 20 points, 7 assists, and 5 rebounds, it may not bother him to have only one hustle play – but it kills him to get cupcaked.”

There are obviously more ways to use statistics to help motivate your team as well as show them how they can improve. Q & A With the Difference-Makers

Rus Baer moved to Columbia in the fall of 1998 to cover high school sports for the Tribune. Rus grew up in Perryville, Mo., where he was a three-sport athlete on three horrible teams at St. Vincent High School. Rus is a graduate of Southeast Missouri State University, where, in a desperate attempt to gain something worthwhile from his college education, he started working for the campus newspaper. The writing gig helped Rus land an internship at a real newspaper during his final semester, which, after about four months successfully renting cars for a national chain, eventually led to his first full-time newspaper job in 1996 as a sportswriter for the Blytheville Courier News and Osceola Times in northeast Arkansas. Rus also wrote for the Southeast Missourian in Cape Girardeau before coming to the Tribune. Rus lives in Columbia with a blue heeler/beagle mix by the name of Hobbes, who faithfully fetches tennis balls and the Tribune every opportunity he's given. Hard Court Herald: There is no doubt that covering prep sports is a different animal than the collegiate or professional scene. What changes or allowances as a reporter do you make for the coverage and/or commentary of these events and athletes?

Rus Baer: I would say most high school writers attempt to accentuate the positives of the particular team or players they cover while limiting the criticism or negativity in their writing. Coaches get criticized by parents and fans enough, so need for us writers to chime in, right? When I cover a game, I look for the story of the team in my coverage area. If they win, I usually have more things to write about and everyone a tad happier to see me. If they get bombed, things get a little more difficult. I usually try to get an interview with at least one player win or lose, but if it's a difficult loss I give players the option of opting out of interviews. It's not life or death....just a game.....if a kid wants to talk about it, great. Honestly, some kids handle these interviews better than the coaches. At the pro and college levels, players normally don't have a choice, unless they sneak out of the locker room like rats.

HCH: Given the first question, as a pseudo reporter myself here with the newsletter and covering the high school scene through my web-site, I have seen prep athletes and coaches being held to standards that, in the past, have been reserved for upper levels of sports. Have you been witness to any of that, and if so, how have you as a reporter dealt with the changes?

RB: Perhaps an example of this would be the over-the-top reporting of premiere players by recruiting web sites. I know people love to know where kids are going to go to college, but I find a lot of these recruiting stories kind of ridiculous and disturbing. They're high school kids, people. Let's not treat them like the saviors of your respective college team just yet. I guess wins and losses are still pretty important to fans and parents at the high school level, too. Some coaches at certain schools can catch some heat and criticism because someone might have an elevated opinion of their son or daughter's athletic ability, but I think, for the most part, people still realize what high school sports are all about and that most coaches aren't Satan.

HCH: How have you seen the internet affect coverage of high school athletics?

RB: It hasn't made my life any easier and unfortunately hasn't fattened my pocketbook. At some newspapers, it's added a sense of urgency to an already urgent deadline situation. Instead of reading a story in the morning newspaper, folks can go online and read a brief story by the time the highlights on the 10 o'clock news are finished. There has obviously been a push by all media outlets to cover events in as many ways as possible. TV people are writing stories for their Web sites, while writers (this guy included) are carrying video recorders to games to post highlights on the Web. The line between print and broadcast media is definitely getting blurred, for better or worse. It's good for fans, I guess, because it offers more coverage. For media types, it offers more work for the same pay and can sometimes distract you from what you're there to do (in my case, write about the event).

HCH: I've always felt that most interviews with athletes (and coaches for that matter) can be written pre-interview as clichés are amazingly predominant in post-game interviews. That is a personal pet peeve of mine however. When you cover a story or do an interview, what are things that make it either hard to do much with the story or (on a more positive note) write the story itself for you?

RB: My personal plan of attack is to ask enough questions to get something usable from everyone I talk to. Sometimes, that can take a lot of questions! I try to be brief, though. Clichés are usually ignored, but sometimes a cliché question deserves a cliché answer. I blame ESPN and every TV sideline reporter for any awful interviews that occur. Some kids don't have a whole lot to say, and that's cool. After a while, I learn who my "go-to" quote kids are. The one time I was interviewed in high school after a big win, I was so excited, I cursed about every other word. Fortunately, the reporter was nice enough to clean up my quotes. I probably wasn't considered a "go-to" quote. Not everyone is.

HCH: Please recall an event or story (or two for that matter) that really were fun for you to cover and helped make the job as a prep sports reporter really worthwhile?

RB: In 14 years of covering high school sports (the past 11 in Columbia), there have been many. Probably the experience that sums up my thoughts about covering high school sports would be the Harrisburg boys' state-championship basketball run in 2006. After two miserable seasons covering the Missouri football team for the Tribune, I switched back to the high school beat just in time to follow Harrisburg's memorable run to its first state title. Harrisburg senior Kyle Fisher was amazing. If anybody remembers watching Nevada's Chris Smith in the early 90's, that's who Fisher reminded me of. I saw Smith at the final four in 1991 and will never forget it. It continues to impress me the way this small community supports its teams. Small towns, for the most part, still have that old-school high school atmosphere I remember as a player. As the primary prep writer for the two big high schools in Columbia (Hickman and Rock Bridge), it's kind of a drag to watch basketball games in half-empty gyms all time. I enjoy the opportunities when I get to cover events at the smaller schools.



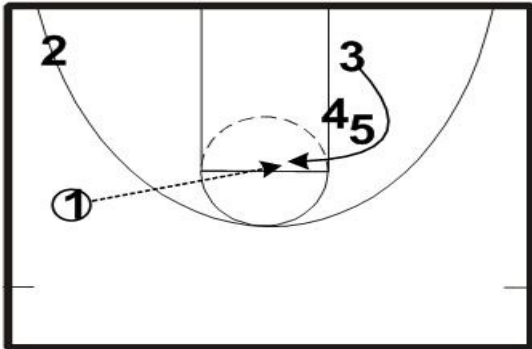
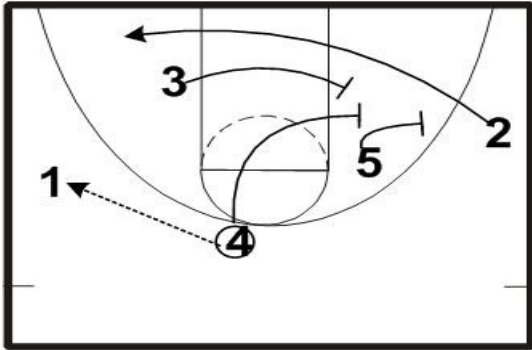
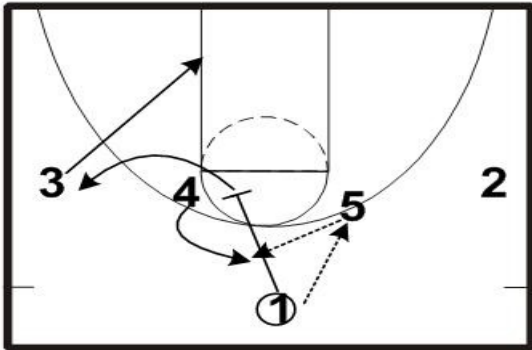

1. Meeting was called to order at 9:00 AM by MBCA Treasurer Tonya Mirts
2. Minutes of the October 21, 2009 MBCA Board Meeting were handed out and approved.
3. Treasurer's Report was handed out and approved.
4. Kevin Garner of the MSHSAA spoke to the Board
 - A. He covered the items that were covered on the 13th of March with the following comments:
